avant garde theorist and architect bernard tschumi is equally well known for his writing and his practice architecture and disjunction which brings together tschumi s essays from 1975 to 1990 is a lucid and provocative analysis of many of the key issues that have engaged architectural discourse over the past two decades from deconstructive theory to recent concerns with the notions of event and program the essays develop different themes in contemporary theory as they relate to the actual making of architecture attempting to realign the discipline with a new world culture characterized by both discontinuity and heterogeneity included are a number of seminal essays that incited broad attention when they first appeared in magazines and journals as well as more recent and topical texts tschumi s discourse has always been considered radical and disturbing he opposes modernist ideology and postmodern nostalgia since both impose restrictive criteria on what may be deemed legitimate cultural conditions he argues for focusing on our immediate cultural situation which is distinguished by a new postindustrial unhomeliness reflected in the ad hoc erection of buildings with multipurpose programs the condition of new york and the chaos of tokyo are thus perceived as legitimate urban forms

including an exhaustive presentation of sketches models computer renderings working drawings and photographs of the construction process and the finished work this book documents the project at a level of detail that allows complete and careful study from its conception to its completion this in depth graphic presentation is accompanied by commentaries from the architect as well as series editors jeffery kipnis and todd gannon that further explore both the cultural and technical significance of this important building book jacket

Tschumi is widely credited with leading the graduate school of architecture, planning, and preservation at New York's Columbia University into the digital age and positioning the school at the forefront of the architectural vanguard during his fifteen-year tenure. Architect and educator Bernard Tschumi is one of the most influential figures in architectural theory and practice. This fascinating volume presents, in a sequence of ten conversations, his autobiography in architecture from his conceptual proposals of the early 1970s through his major current buildings and projects. Tschumi approaches his work as the gradual construction of an argument; the conversations drawn from a six-year series of interviews with critic Enrique Walker represent that argument in an analysis of Tschumi's writings, buildings, and other works. The conversations offer a clear-eyed analysis of Tschumi's work, suggesting the interwoven relationship between the strategies of each individual design and the formation of the architect's overarching theoretical project. Among the major works of architecture investigated are Parc de la Villette in Paris, Le Fresnoy National Studio for Contemporary Arts in Tourcoing, France, and the New Acropolis Museum in Athens. focusing on six leading contemporary architects peter eisenman frank gehry bernard tschumi zaha hadid rem koolhaas and steven holl this book puts forward a unique and insightful analysis of neo avant garde architecture it discusses the spectacle and excess which permeates contemporary architecture in reference to the present aesthetic tendency for image making but does so by applying the tectonic of theatricality discussed by the 19th century german architect gottfried semper in doing so it breaks new ground by opening up a dialogue between the study of the past and the design of the present the work of each discussed architect is seen as addressing a historiographical problem to this end and this is the second important aspect of this book the chosen buildings are discussed in terms of the thematic of the culture of building the tectonic of column and wall for example rather than the formal and this through a discussion that is informed by the latest available theories having set the aesthetic implication of the processes of the digitalization of architecture the book's conclusion highlights strategies by which architecture might postpone the full consequences of digitalization and thus the becoming of architecture as ornament on its own right

and the banalities of nicketown but beyond outlining the status quo klingmann also alerts us to the dangers of brandscapes by favoring the creation of signature buildings over more comprehensive urban interventions and by severing their identity from the complexity of the social fabric klingmann argues today s brandscapes have in many cases resulted in a culture of the copy as experiences become more and more commodified and the global landscape progressively more homogenized it falls to architects to infuse an ever more aseptic landscape with meaningful transformations how can architects use branding as a means to differentiate places from the inside out and not as current development practices seem to dictate from the outside in when architecture brings together ecology economics and social well being to help people and places regain self sufficiency writes klingmann it can be a catalyst for cultural and economic transformation

examines the influence of twentieth century avant garde movements on the contemporary architectural landscape through the work of disruptors such as frank gehry rem koolhaas and zaha hadid with an irregular format designed by celebrated graphic designer abbott miller of pentagram in architecture unbound noted architecture critic joseph giovannini proposes that our current architectural landscape ultimately emerged from transgressive and progressive art movements that had roiled europe before and after world war i by the 1960s social unrest and cultural disruption opened the way for investigations into an inventive antiauthoritarian architecture explorations emerged in the 1970s and built projects surfaced in the 1980s taking digital form in the 1990s with large scale projects finally landing on the far side of the millennium architecture unbound traces all of these developments and influences presenting an authoritative and illuminating history not only of the sources of contemporary currents in architecture but also of the twentieth century avant garde and the twenty first century digital revolution in form making and profiling the most influential practitioners and their most notable projects including frank gehry s

a lovingly book devoted to the too brief career of a swiss architect who stood outside the conventions of the post war jean tschumi architecture at full scale is the first book on a swiss architect who after his training at the ecole des beaux arts in paris entered the polemical field of modernity and its technological expression interrupted by his tragic death in 1962 at the age of 57 tschumi s work is rich in theoretical questions what is the meaning of the design at full scale not only for carpets tables or armchairs why does the architect study his compositions at the minimal scale of a postage stamp is furniture the starting point of architecture why should the project be studied through the systematical use of variants does the future of the city lie in the planning of deep underground systems

in the empty place democracy and public space teresa hoskyns explores the relationship of public space to democracy by relating different theories of democracy in political philosophy to spatial theory and spatial and political practice establishing the theoretical basis for the study of public space hoskyns examines the rise of representative democracy and investigates contemporary theories for the future of democracy focusing on the chantal mouffe s agonistic model and the civil society model of jürgen habermas she argues that these models of participatory democracy can co exist and are necessarily spatial the book then provides diverse perspectives on how the role of physical public space is articulated through three modes of participatory spatial practice the first focuses on issues of participation in architectural practice through a set of projects exploring the open spaces of a postwar housing estate in euston the second examines the role of space in the construction of democratic identity through a feminist architecture art collective

producing space through writing performance and events the third explores participatory political democratic practice through social forums at global european and city levels hoskyns concludes that participatory democracy requires a conception of public space as the empty place allowing different models and practices of democracy to co exist
